





#### Oregon State Ballot Measures

**Measures 86 & 87:** Referred to the People by the Legislative Assembly.

**Measure 88:** Citizen Referendum.

**Measures 89-92:** Proposed by Initiative Petition.

**86 Amends Constitution: Requires creation of fund for Oregonians pursuing post-secondary education, authorizes state indebtedness to finance the fund.**

**Result of "Yes" Vote:** "Yes" vote would amend the Oregon Constitution to require the legislature to establish a permanent Student Opportunity Fund. Income received would provide aid to Oregonians pursuing post-secondary education, including career training. Measure authorizes State to incur debt to finance the Fund.

**Result of "No" Vote:** "No" vote means Constitution will not be amended to extend credit and incur debt to create a dedicated fund to provide financial aid for Oregon students pursuing higher education.

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<p><b>87</b>      <b>Amends Constitution:</b>  <b>Permits employment of state judges by National Guard (military service) and state public universities (teaching)</b></p> <p><b>Result of "Yes" Vote:</b> "Yes" vote would allow state court judges to be paid to teach at public universities or work in the Oregon National Guard.</p> <p><b>Result of "No" Vote:</b> "No" vote retains existing constitutional restriction that persons employed by one branch of the state government (in this case, the judiciary) may not also serve in a second branch.</p> <p><input type="checkbox"/> <b>Yes</b>  <input type="checkbox"/> <b>No</b></p>	<p><b>88</b>      <b>Provides Oregon resident "driver card" without requiring proof of legal presence in the United States.</b></p> <p><b>Result of "Yes" Vote:</b> "Yes" vote would allow persons living in Oregon at least one year who cannot prove legal presence in the U.S. to obtain a limited-time and limited-use driver card if they meet all other requirements.</p> <p><b>Result of "No" Vote:</b> "No" vote retains existing law that people who cannot prove legal presence in the U.S. will not be able to drive legally in Oregon.</p> <p><input type="checkbox"/> <b>Yes</b>  <input type="checkbox"/> <b>No</b></p> <p>(NOT FOR OFFICIAL USE)</p>	<p><b>89</b>      <b>Amends Constitution:</b>  <b>State/political subdivision shall not deny or abridge equality of rights on account of sex.</b></p> <p><b>Result of "Yes" Vote:</b> "Yes" vote would add a section to Article I, the Bill of Rights, of the Oregon Constitution saying, "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the State of Oregon or by any political subdivision of the state on account of sex."</p> <p><b>Result of "No" Vote:</b> "No" vote retains current prohibition on laws that treat people differently based on sex, unless justified by specific biological differences. 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<p><b>90</b> Changes general election nomination processes: Provides for single primary ballot listing all candidates; top two advance.</p> <p><b>Result of "Yes" Vote:</b> "Yes" vote changes primary election system. Voting on the primary ballot would be open to all party-affiliated and non-affiliated voters and would allow them to choose one candidate for each partisan office from all qualified candidates, regardless of political party. Top two candidates, regardless of party, would then advance to general election.</p> <p><b>Result of "No" Vote:</b> "No" vote means the primary system that is currently in effect in Oregon will remain the same.</p> <p><input type="checkbox"/> Yes</p> <p><input type="checkbox"/> No</p>	<p><b>91</b> Allows possession, manufacture, sale of marijuana by/to adults, subject to state licensing, regulation, and taxation.</p> <p><b>Result of "Yes" Vote:</b> "Yes" vote would require the Oregon Liquor Control Commission (OLCC) to license, regulate, and tax the in-state manufacture, processing, and retail sales of marijuana to persons 21 and older beginning in 2016. Current medical marijuana laws would be retained.</p> <p><b>Result of "No" Vote:</b> "No" vote maintains current law. Current law makes possession of less than an ounce of marijuana a non-criminal infraction. Possession of more than an ounce is a criminal infraction. Laws permitting production and possession of cannabis for medical use would not be affected.</p> <p><input type="checkbox"/> Yes</p> <p><input type="checkbox"/> No</p> <p>(NOT FOR OFFICIAL USE)</p>	<p><b>92</b> Requires food manufacturers, retailers to label "genetically engineered" foods as such; State and citizens may enforce.</p> <p><b>Result of "Yes" Vote:</b> "Yes" vote would require labels on raw and packaged foods that are produced entirely or partially by genetic engineering, commonly called Genetically Modified Organisms (GMOs), effective January 2016 and would apply to suppliers, manufacturers, and retailers.</p> <p><b>Result of "No" Vote:</b> "No" vote maintains existing law, which does not require labeling genetically engineered, or GMO foods.</p> <p><input type="checkbox"/> Yes</p> <p><input type="checkbox"/> No</p>
